Some Social Customs

ABOUT LIVING IN NORTHAMPTON

LIKE ALL PEOPLE, Americans have unique social customs. A few are mentioned below, but it is not possible to list them all. By observing and asking questions, you can learn about others.

TIME:

In American culture, punctuality is valued. Arriving promptly for scheduled events, such as classes or social engagements, demonstrates respect for others' time and is appreciated.

INFORMALITY & GREETINGS:

American interactions are often casual, with the use of first names common. When meeting someone, a handshake and a simple "hello" or "pleased to meet you" suffice. Responding to "How are you?" with "Fine, thank you, and you?" is typical.

INVITATIONS:


Americans may express general friendliness like "You must come and see us," but a formal invitation includes specific details like time, date, and location. Responding with either a "yes" or "no," and honoring commitments, reflects courteousness. Declining graciously with a "no, thank you" is polite, while accepting and not attending is considered impolite.

What to Expect in Your Home-stay

Living with a host family in the USA is a unique opportunity to immerse yourself in American culture while experiencing genuine hospitality. Your host family will not only provide you with a comfortable living space but also offer invaluable support and insights into daily life in the US. Embrace this enriching experience, build meaningful connections, and create lasting memories during your stay.

Hosts:

- Carefully selected to ensure warmth and support
- Friendly, caring, eager to learn about your culture
- Don't hesitate to ask questions or share your plans
- · Regular check-ins ensure any issues are promptly addressed

Families:

- Diversity is celebrated; no "typical" family
- Expect parents with full-time jobs and varied structures
- Everyone pitches in with housework, fostering a sense of community

Meals:

- Relaxed breakfasts and lunches, often self-prepared
- Dinner is a shared, main meal, fostering family bonding
- · Your dietary preferences are valued and accommodated

Etiquette:

- · Offer to help with household tasks and communicate openly
- Share any allergies or discomforts, ensuring a comfortable stay
- · Always inform your host if you won't be joining for dinner

Pets:

· Many families have pets; inform of any allergies beforehand



Household Tasks:

- Collaboration in housekeeping and chores promotes a supportive environment
- Be responsible for your own space and help when needed

Miscellaneous:

- Smoking indoors is not common; ask your host for designated areas
- Embrace the religious diversity of the area
- Remember, no alcohol for under 21s
- Leave your room as you found it and show gratitude with a thankyou note
- Stay connected with your host post-stay; they'll appreciate it!
